MHAC OFFICIALLY OPEN



A CROWD OF ABOUT 170 PEOPLE WITNESSED THE OFFICIAL OPENING OF THE MAX HAZELTON AERO CENTRE ON 24 AUGUST 2013.

The momentous event was officially conducted by Orange Aero Club Patron and Guest of Honour, Max Hazelton OBE, in conjunction with Member for Orange Andrew Gee and Orange City Councillor Chris Gryllis.

The long-awaited event was the culmination of the activity which has taken place over the past year, but which had it's genesis around ten years ago, when planning started to get serious.

A major component of the Centre is the inclusion of the Aero Medical Interchange Facility - a secure, comfortable area where patients can be transferred between Air Ambulance and Road Ambulance.

The facility will also benefit Ambulance staff and aircrew, by providing some basic comfortable facilities during inevitable delays.

Until now transfers have had to take place in the open air, regardless of the weather and time of day or night.

While the Orange Aero Club owns the building, it will be used by Orange City Council as a temporary Terminal, whilst the existing terminal is being demolished and a brand new facility constructed. This is expected to take about eighteen months to two years.

This unique arrangement has allowed the facility to be constructed much earlier than would have otherwise been possible, and at a great cost saving to the club, whilst also saving the City the cost of providing a temporary facility whilst the new terminal was being constructed.

It has been aptly described as a "Win-Win" situation for all parties.

Once the building is returned to the Aero Club after minor alterations, the building will be available for hire to community and business groups and for private functions. It will be a first class function centre with full conference facilities.

The next day saw the building open to the public, and many Orange residents dropped in to inspect the facility.


