Rumours Abound, But...

You've probably heard rumours of the commencement of a new flight training facility in Orange, now that Orange Aviation is no longer active, and not looking likely to be.

At this stage they are just that - rumours - but of course they may well come to fruition, and in time we might be able to establish an alliance such as we had with Orange Aviation in better days.

In the meantime, the club is determined to arrange regular visits by an instructor, partly to conduct club flying comps, and partly to provide BFRs, revision, familiarisation flights etc. The first of these is sunday 22 February, (see the box on Page 1) then every second month on club day.

To make this a viable exercise for the instructor, we need to support the service - or it will disappear!

Victor Gleeson will be starting a helicopter charter business at Orange soon, and helicopter training shortly thereafter, using R44 and R22 respectively... or is this just another rumour?

There's a bit of a misconception about the change to 406 MHz beacons which took place on 1 February. Your old 121.5 MHz beacon will still work - its just that the satellite system will no longer receive and process its signals. In fact, your brand new 406 MHz beacon will also transmit on 121.5 MHz, used for "homeing" by SAR aircraft. Using a 121.5MHz beacon, you will effectively be relying on overflying aircraft to pick up and pass the message on to the authorities. This will further delay the initiation of any search & rescue efforts.

The Sad Passing of Nancy-Bird Walton, AO, OBE

RA-Aus members were deeply saddened to hear of the passing of aviator Nancy-Bird Walton on Tuesday, January 13, 2009.

Her first flying lesson — at the age of seventeen — was conducted by Charles Kingsford-Smith. Nancy became the first female commercial pilot in the English speaking world. She was employed by the Far West (NSW) Children's Home to fly a mobile baby clinic, and became known as the "Angel of the Outback".

Nancy-Bird (as she liked to be known) also worked as Commandant of the Women's Air Training Corps during the Second World War and later founded the

Australian Women Pilots' Association. Last year, Qantas named its first Airbus A380 super jumbo in her honour. Nancy-Bird Walton was a true Australian aviation legend.
